Happy Purim!

What: Purim is a one-day Jewish holiday. It celebrates Jewish deliverance from the plot of Haman the Aggagite to massacre all the Jews living in the Persian kingdom.

Where: The story of Purim is found in Megillat Esther.

When: Purim occurs on the 14th of Adar

Why: Purim is a story of intrigue in the time of the Persian Empire. Mordecai the Jew refuses to bow down to the King's second-in-command Haman, so Haman declares that all Jews will be massacred on the 14th of Adar (this date was chosen based on the choosing of lots, purim in Hebrew, from which the holiday derives its name. Queen Esther reveals her Jewish identity to the King at a small party with just the two of them and Haman present. The King decides to overturn Haman's decree and change the day of a proposed massacre into a day for the Jews to seek revenge against their oppressors, changing the 14th of Adar from a day of sadness and mourning to a day of joyous celebrations for the Jews.

How: There are four commandments to be fulfilled on Purim.

- 1. Reading the Megillah (March 20th at 7:00 pm)
- 2. Giving Charity (Matanot Laevyonim): On Purim, Jews are required to give gifts to the poor in order to commemorate the charity God gave the Jews by overturning Haman's evil decree. The requirement is to give at least one gift to two different needy people, at least two gifts in total.
- 3. The Festive Meal (Seuda): In the afternoon of Purim we are instructed to partake in a festive meal. This feast is commemorative of the feast Esther had with the King and Haman where she asked the King to save the Jews.
- 4. Sending Gifts to One Another (Mishloach Manot). The commandment is to send one gift of two portions of readymade food to another. This commandment is commemorative of the brotherly love that awoke amongst the Jews after the story of Purim occurred.



Happy Pesach!

What: The Search for Hametz

Where: Every part of every room of the house where hametz may possibly be found must be searched using this process. Rooms where hametz is not normally brought (such as a bathroom) need not be searched.

How: The first mishna in the Talmud tractate Pesachim requires that the search for leavened products, bedikat hametz should be performed by candlelight. The lights around the house are turned off, and a candle is lit. A blessing is recited. To prevent the possibility of making a blessing in vain, a bracha levatala, which might occur if there was no chance of finding hametz in the house. To keep children interested and involved, there is a widespread custom to "seed" the area to be searched. Pieces (usually 10 because of kabbalistic overtones) of hametz are hidden around the house, preferably by a child if available. These pieces must be small and should be wrapped so that crumbs do not escape. Traditionally, a feather and a wooden spoon are used, and whenever a piece of hametz is found the feather is used to sweep the piece of hametz into the wooden spoon, which is then used to place it in a bag. It is best to use a candle to illuminate the areas; however, it is perfectly acceptable to use a flashlight or other light source.

May this Passover be especially sweet and joyful. May each and every one experience the fullness of joy and delight that surrounds the celebration of the birth of the people and nation of Israel. May the lessons of Passover be learned, absorbed, and taught with devotion to our ancestors and with a freshness and vigor that will assure the ongoing, ever-constant renewal of our traditions. Temple Israel wishes you a hag kasher v'sameakh, a kosher and joyous holiday.

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FROM OUR RABBI

One of the most important tasks of the ancient Temple service was performed by the *Kohen* – a descendant from the family of Aaron (the brother of Moses). Together with the *Levi* (who assisted), the many rituals of our Torah concerning animal sacrifice and the like was presided over by the *Kohen*.

What about today, since there is no longer a Temple or animal sacrifice? We still honor both the Kohen and the Levi by giving them the first and second (respectively) Aliyot over the Torah when it is read. In addition, when the Blessing of the Kohanim ("Duchanin") is done, it is performed by

the Kohanim in the congregation. Both of these practices have to do with the honor of the Kohen.

Another matter is the law concerning a *Kohen* in proximity to a corpse. In ancient times, when the *Kohen* performed the ritual of animal sacrifice, it was imperative that he maintained a state of ritual purity, and so he was not allowed to be involved in or in any way near the deceased, which would have made the *Kohen* ritually impure, and thus unfit for his primary role in the Temple.

Today, the Law Committee of our Conservative Movement has decreed that since there is no practical function for *Kohanim* today (i.e., there is no longer animal sacrifice), and since there is a great Mitzvah to honor the dead by being involved in their funeral and burial, we strongly encourage *Kohanim* to take part in the rituals. There is no longer any practical prohibition on a *Kohen* being in proximity to a corpse.

This is a prime example of the Conservative Movement responding to Modernity with Halacha – Jewish Law.

I (We) also sell my (our) pet(s) with the understanding that it is still my (our) responsibility to care for said pet(s), using any appropriate food, until the new owner physically takes possession. It is understood that this hametz will not be my (our) property from 11:30 a.m., Monday, April 10, 2017, through 9:00 p.m., Tuesday, April 18, 2017, and that I (we) will derive no use or benefit from it. This authorization is in accordance to the Document of Authorization to which this statement is to be appended. Last day to sell the chametz is Monday before the 7:00 am service
